Things you will need to do

1. Check your QTAC application regularly

4. Enrol in your course and set up a new university email – they will use this to correspond with you going forward	
5. Study university information to select subjects (contact the university if you need help with this). This is where attendance at Orientation can be beneficial.	
6. Note the time and date to sign up for lectures and tutorials (the good ones go quickly)	
7. Familiarise yourself with university webpages, e.g. QUT Blackboard, ACU Student Connect, etc.	

ATAR and Senior Results

When and where do I find this?

Log on to your QTAC ATAR account (where you registered) on Friday 16 December. (Usually between 8am and 9am).

What do I do if I think my ATAR is incorrect?

QTAC offers an ATAR Appeals process with gives ATAR recipients the opportunity to request a review of their final ATAR result calculation. You can lodge an appeal with QTAC - https://www.qtac.edu.au/atar-appeals/. This must be done by 31 January 2023.

Where do I find the results for my External Exams?

You can find the results for your External Exams on the QCAA Student Portal https://mygce.gcaa.gld.edu.au/ in late December – after you have finished Year 12. You will receive an overall mark out of 100 and a grade of A-E.

Where can I access my Queensland Certificate of **Education?**

Your Senior Education Profile (SEP) can also be accessed on the QCAA Student Portal. The documents in your learning account **are official** – they have a digital signature and unique document ID to confirm they are authentic. You can download and save the documents as a PDF from your learning account at any time. You will not be provided with a hard copy of your Queensland Certificate of Education - this must be accessed through the Student Portal.

If you're having trouble accessing the Student Portal, check the FAQs (https://myqce.gcaa.qld.edu.au/assessment-and-results/results) they may have the answer you need.

You can change your preferences three times for free. There is a fee each time after this.

To change your preferences:

- Log in to your QTAC account and select 'My Application'
- Under Course Preferences, select 'view or edit preferences', then 'change preferences'
- You can add, delete or edit your preferences, or re-order them using the arrows
- Once you have made all of the changes you want, save them
- Remember that you should only 'save' when you have finished all your changes
- Don't forget to change your preferences by the due date for the offer round https://www.qtac.edu.au/key-dates/
- Please note, QUT's Second Early Offer Round will take place on Saturday 26 November. Please ensure all documentation is lodged by 18 November.



Responding to an Offer

You've got an offer from QTAC...now what?



─ I'm happy & I'm ready to enrol.

ACCEPT

Check with the institution for enrolment details & dates

- I no longer wish to study this course.
 REJECT
- I'm happy but I'm not ready to enrol yet.

DEFER

Check with the institution for deferment details.

I'd like to be considered for my higher preferences.

CONDITIONALLY RESPOND

Check in on the next offer round date to see if you've received a new offer.

What else do I need to know?

If you conditionally accept an offer, you will need to rearrange your preferences so that any other courses you wish to be considered for sit above your conditionally accepted offer.

Please note; you can't conditionally accept a first preference

Contact QTAC to check if you can reactivate a previous offer or change the repsonse to your offer.

If you enrol in a course and no longer wish to study it, withdraw from it with the institution to avoid penalties.

Check your offer email for response information - some institutions will only let you conditionally accept an offer for a short amount of time.

Some institutions may require you to enrol within a certain timeframe in order to secure your place. Check your offer email for details.

How we assess applications

We assess each application on a case-by-case basis. Our International Admissions team will review your qualification to check that it meets the requirements of the program you're interested in.

UPGRADING – HOW IT WORKS....

If you complete ONE year (*i.e. 8 subjects*) of ANY Bachelor degree with ANY starting ATAR/RANK at ANY University, you can increase your RANK. Remember, an ATAR is only useful ONCE! (*Once you study one year, it's all based on a Rank*).

Universities work on a 7 scale; **4 is the pass rate (50% or a C).** If you just pass your first year (a GPA of 4), you will increase your **Rank to a 93**. If you do better than pass, your Rank will improve.

PATHWAYS TO UNIVERSITY AND/OR ALTERNATIVE STUDY

Do you need a Pre-requisite for Uni?

Adult Tertiary Preparation (ATP) – Certificate IV: Offered by most TAFE and other Private Providers (eg. Hubbards). The ATP aims to equip students with the skills required for successful tertiary study. It does not need to be completed but can help with needed areas eg. *Language and Learning Skills* for English Pre-requisites.

QUT: Bridging Courses for Assumed Knowledge for Maths B (\$1500), Chemistry (\$1500) and Physics (\$1500). Full details on the following site: *QUT - Bridging programs*

UQ College (St Lucia): 4-week Intensive Bridging Courses, \$1500 each (November to December): Maths Methods, Biology and Chemistry. Successful completion of these courses will meet prerequisites in these subjects for UQ degree programs. Results will be available for the QTAC January offer round. UQ College (St Lucia) Tertiary Preparation Program *FREE apart from \$220 enrolment* – 28 Weeks in trimester periods (January, May and September). Courses are offered in Academic English for University Studies (Core); Pre-University Mathematics A or B (core); Electives in: Business Management, Economics, Behavioural Science, Biology, Chemistry, Research Skills, and Health, Exercise and Diet. *Tertiary Preparation Program - UQ College - University of Queensland**

UniSQ Pathway Programs: Successful completion of the following programs can guarantee entry to USQ undergraduate courses:

- **a. Tertiary Preparation Program (TPP)** *FREE* can be completed in **one semester** via distance education or on-campus at Springfield and Toowoomba. The program develops writing, computing and general study skills for further study. See <u>Tertiary Preparation Program University Preparation Course University of Southern Queensland (unisq.edu.au) for details.</u>
- **b.** *Diploma of University Studies* is a formal university qualification and provides a quality foundation for tertiary study to set you up for university success. You can choose one of eight specialisations which allows you to sample study areas you are interested in. Once successfully completed you can graduate with a degree qualification or, provided you meet all the entry requirements, you can transfer directly into a UniSQ undergraduate degree. This program is for Year 12 students who haven't chosen an ATAR pathway or are not confident of gaining entry to a degree course. Successful completion of the program guarantees entry into selected USQ undergraduate programs.

TRANSITION TO UNIVERSITY LIFE AND KEYS TO SUCCESS AT UNIVERSITY

Transition refers to your experience settling into University as a first year student. Arriving at university can be overwhelming at the start, and the transition experience will be different for everyone. There is no best way to start university. However, make the most of every opportunity ©

There are four key aspects to your transition from School to University:

Academic

- Choose your subjects carefully
- Enjoy your subjects and keep up-to-date with your workload
- Know how to download and/or access a missed lecture
- · Learn how to study and build rewards into study time
- Attend all classes and tutorials
- Be organised and learn independent study skills
- Learn how to stay on top of the assessment in your subjects
- Know where to ask for help if you need it
- Use the Library and other Faculty services
- · Make sure you know exactly how to submit assignments and other academic requirements

Geographic

- Find your way to the campus using public transport (car parking can be a nightmare!)
- Finding your way around a huge campus can be daunting you're not the only one to get lost!
- Locate your faculty lecture rooms and the Faculty Office
- Find the Course and Careers Centre and other services (eg. Medical Centre; Sports)
- Locate the different food outlets and the surprising areas each University has
- If you're new to the area, get to know your new city/town

Personal

- · Make sure you do not get lost in the crowd
- Make new friends. Orientation Week and Faculty events are a great way to start
- Get involved: join a study group, ask a friend from your tutorial for a coffee or join one of the many clubs, sports and societies offered
- Balance study time and paid work carefully
- Fight procrastination
- · Avoid perfectionism
- Set goals which are both realistic and challenging

Administrative

- Manage your enrolment and know about deadlines and dates for subject withdrawal especially the Census Date each semester
- Balance study, social life and work through time management skills
- Learn how to navigate the library and information systems
- Ask for help: ask often and ask early!

IMPORTANT NOTE REGARDING CSP/HECS - CENSUS DATE

Approximately 4 weeks after starting EACH University semester, you will be given a date at which HECS kicks in. If you are not happy with your subject/course, you can WITHDRAW by this date and not have <u>ANY</u> repercussions financially (i.e.. No HECS for that subject/s) and academically. If you drop-out AFTER this date, you will incur both a **HECS debt** AND a potential **fail** on your Academic record (for life). Please make yourself aware of this date as it can save you enormous future angst.
